RE: **AB 1994 (Skinner)** – As amended on March 23, 2010 – **OPPOSE**

Dear Assembly Member Skinner:

The San Bernardino County Board of Supervisors regrets it must oppose AB 1994. This legislation would provide, with respect to hospital employees who provide direct patient care in an acute care hospital, that the term "injury" includes a blood-borne infectious disease, neck or back impairment, methicillin-resistant Staphylococcus aureus (MRSA), or H1N1 influenza virus that develops or manifests itself during the period of the person's employment with the hospital.

As you know, current workers' compensation law states that the employee must show that there is a nexus between employments and the injury or illness. Under AB 1994, the employer, in this case the County of San Bernardino, would be placed with the burden to prove that an injury did or did not occur in the workplace.

AB 1994 would make it nearly impossible for the county to rebut a claim of the conditions mentioned in the bill. Not only does AB 1994 extend this impossible high standard to specified hospital employees, but it also adds a new presumption of injury to the Labor Code for injury to the neck and contraction of the H1N1 virus. There is no doubt that healthcare costs will rise as hospitals are forced to pay the increased cost of workers' compensation created by AB 1994. AB 1994 creates an expensive, unreasonable, and unnecessary mandate on San Bernardino County's public hospital at a time when, due to the state's fiscal crisis, state and local funding for health services is scarce.

For these reasons, the San Bernardino County Board of Supervisors joins with the California State Association of Counties in opposing AB 1994.
