National Environmental Information Exchange Network Grant Program

The Exchange Network Grant Program provides funding to states, tribes, inter-tribal consortia and territories to develop and implement the information technology and information management capabilities they need to actively participate in the Exchange Network. This grant program supports the exchange of environmental data and collaborative work within the Exchange Network. Grantees may also use grant funds for the standardization, exchange and integration of geospatial information to support work to preserve and improve the environment, natural resources, and human health. Regional air pollution control districts, and some public universities may apply for assistance if they are agencies or instrumentalities of a state under applicable state laws.

EPA's Brownfields Program provides funds to empower states, Brownfields Assessment Grants – provides funds to inventory, characterize, assess, and conduct planning (including cleanup planning) and community involvement related to brownfield sites

Brownfields Cleanup Grants

The Small Business Liability Relief and Brownfields Revitalization Act ("Brownfields Law", P.L. 107-118) requires the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to publish guidance to assist applicants in preparing proposals for grants to assess and clean up brownfield sites. EPA's Brownfields Program provides funds to empower states, communities, tribes, and nonprofits to prevent, inventory, assess, clean up, and reuse brownfield sites. Brownfields Cleanup Grants - provides funds to carry out cleanup activities at a specific brownfield site owned by the applicant. Under these guidelines, EPA is seeking proposals for Cleanup Grants only.

Brownfields Revolving Loan Fund (RLF) Grants – provides funds for a grant recipient to capitalize a revolving fund and to make loans and provide subgrants to carry out cleanup activities at brownfield sites.

Health Center Program grants support a variety of community-based and patient-directed public and private nonprofit organizations that serve an increasing number of the Nation's underserved. Individually, each health center plays an important role in the goal of ensuring access to services, and combined, they have had a critical impact on the health care status of medically underserved and vulnerable populations throughout the United States and its territories. Targeting the Nation's neediest populations and geographic areas, the Health Center Program currently funds more than 1,200 health centers that operate more than 8,500 service delivery sites in every state, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, and the Pacific Basin. In 2011, more than 20 million medically underserved and uninsured patients received comprehensive, culturally competent, quality primary health care services through the Health Center Program. This Funding Opportunity Announcement (FOA) solicits applications for the Health Center Program's Service Area Competition-Additional Area.

Prevention of HIV Transmission/Acquisition through a better understanding of Reproductive Health

This funding opportunity announcement (FOA) issued by the Eunice Kennedy Shriver National Institute of Child Health and Human Development (NICHD), National Institutes of Health (NIH), invites Research Project Grant applications to further our understanding of HIV acquisition/transmission by increasing our knowledge regarding the intersection between reproductive health and HIV prevention. The emphasis of the FOA is to encourage comprehensive behavioral-biomedical approaches that can lead to new insights in HIV prevention research. This FOA is not intended to fund drug discovery or large scale clinical trials.

Tobacco Control Regulatory Research

The purpose of this Funding Opportunity Announcement (FOA) is to encourage biomedical, behavioral, and social science research that will inform the development and evaluation of regulations on tobacco product manufacturing, distribution, and marketing. Research projects must address the research priorities related to the regulatory authority of the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) Center for Tobacco Products (CTP) as mandated by the Family Smoking Prevention and Tobacco Control Act. The awards under this FOA will be administered by NIH using designated funds from the FDA CTP for tobacco regulatory science. Research results from this FOA are expected to generate findings and data that are directly relevant to inform the FDA's regulation of the manufacture, distribution, and marketing of tobacco products to protect public health. **Deadline: January 7, 2016**

Despite progress in HIV/AIDS treatment and prevention and reductions in HIV/morbidity and mortality, HIV/AIDS health disparities remain a challenge that must be addressed. This FOA encourages research to identify the role(s) that drug abuse plays in fueling the epidemic in vulnerable groups (racial/ethnic minorities, men who have sex with men (MSM), youth) in the United States and to develop effective interventions to prevent new infections and to improve the health and well-being of those living with HIV/AIDS. This FOA will support studies in vulnerable populations to: 1) understand the contribution of drug abuse (both injection and non-injection) to the acquisition and/or transmission of HIV; 2) study disease progression and disease outcomes; 3) develop and/or improve prevention and treatment interventions, particularly comprehensive, integrated interventions; 4) improve the availability, delivery and quality of evidence-based prevention and treatment services across a variety of settings; and 5)

address organizational, structural, and/or community level factors including social, drug-using, and sexual networks associated with health disparities.

Drug Court Training and Technical Assistance Initiative

The awardee will provide training and technical assistance as follows: Evidence-Based Interventions/Systemic Implementation • Develop and deliver on request and free of charge a curriculum on the systemic implementation of alternatives to incarceration at all junctures of the criminal justice system. The curriculum should address effective use of evidence-based interventions based on risk and needs assessments, as well as the appropriate use of incentives and sanctions based on offender characteristics and needs. The curriculum must be made available to every jurisdiction requesting it that has established or is planning to establish a drug court for the purpose of instituting system-wide evidence based substance abuse interventions to reduce the number of drug involved offenders cycling through the criminal justice system. The curriculum must meet the needs of judges, prosecutors, public defenders, defense counsel, probation officers, treatment providers, court coordinators, and law enforcement officers, and must include the applications of proven drug court elements across the criminal justice continuum as well as application of other appropriate evidenced-based interventions. • Develop and deliver on request and free of charge a train-the-trainer curriculum on the systemic implementation of alternatives to incarceration and the effective use of risk and needs assessments and evidence-based interventions. • Provide technical assistance, onsite training, and follow-up assistance when so requested by an existing or intended drug court jurisdiction established for the purpose of instituting system-wide evidence based substance abuse interventions to reduce the number of drug involved offenders cycling through the criminal justice system. The awardee may only request and recoup reasonable travel and per diem expenses from the respective jurisdiction. Develop and conduct free training events for jurisdictional teams including judges, judicial educators, court administrators, higher-level criminal justice authorities, and higher-level personnel from single state agencies administering the SAMSHA treatment block grant concerning the science of addiction and science-based principles of behavioral management. Develop and conduct free training events for law enforcement officers concerning the science of addiction. ONDCP contemplates two modules, one module for law enforcement managers and the other for police officers and sheriff deputies. Suggested content includes addiction as a brain disease, appropriate interventions when dealing with substance abusing individuals, and substance abuse treatment modalities. Additional content as outlined below should be considered for the law enforcement managers' module.

TRANSPORTATION

Domestic Violence Homicide Prevention Demonstration Initiative Despite progress in The Paul S. Sarbanes Transit in Parks Program was established to address the challenge of increasing vehicle congestion in and around our national parks and other federal lands. America's national parks, wildlife refuges, and national forests were created to protect unique environmental and cultural treasures, but are now facing traffic, pollution and crowding that diminishes the visitor experience and threatens the environment. To address these concerns, this program provides funding for alternative transportation systems, such as shuttle buses, rail connections and even bicycle trails. The program seeks to conserve natural, historical, and cultural resources; reduce congestion and pollution; improve visitor mobility and accessibility; enhance visitor experience; and ensure access to all, including persons with disabilities. The program is administered by the U.S. Department of Transportation, together with the Department of the Interior and the U.S. Forest Service. Eligible recipients also include state, tribal, or local governmental authorities with jurisdiction over land in the vicinity of an eligible area acting with the consent of the FLMA. Eligible project areas include any federally owned or managed park, refuge or recreational area open to the general public, including: National Parks, National Wildlife Refuges; Bureau of Land Management recreational areas; Bureau of Reclamation recreational areas; and National Forests. Eligible projects may also include the communities and land surrounding these federal lands.
