Raising Organic Family Farms Grant

Raising Organic Family Farms (ROFF) is an online scholarship and grant program providing financial, education and networking support for aspiring organic family farmers in need. This grant and scholarship program seeks to ensure the next generation of organic family farmers is successful. We support organic farmers who need a little extra help – whether it's a new piece of equipment or advice from an expert. We offer a limited number of small grants and scholarships, and these funds can be used for material needs, such as equipment purchases, supplies or repairs; education funding for coursework, conference registration or continuing education credits. Judges will allocate up to \$50,000 in grants of varying increments.

Gates Foundation: Grand Challenges Explorations

The Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation is accepting proposals for Round 8 of its Grand Challenges Explorations, a \$100 million grant initiative designed to encourage innovation in global health and development research. The program provides initial grants of \$100,000 to scientists, inventors, and entrepreneurs from around the world who are pursuing unconventional ideas that could transform health and agricultural development in the world's poorest countries. Topics of investigation in this funding round include protecting crops from biotic stresses from field to market; exploring nutrition to promote the healthy growth of infants and children; applying synthetic biology to global health challenges; designing new approaches to the optimization of immunization systems; and exploring new solutions in global health priority areas. The program is open to any individual working in any discipline, from student to tenured professor, and from any organization — colleges and universities, government laboratories, research institutions, nonprofit organizations, and for-profit companies.

Basic Research to Enable Agricultural Development

The National Science Foundation (NSF) and the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation (BMGF) are partnering to support a new research program to be administered by NSF. The objective of the BREAD Program is to support innovative basic scientific research designed to address key constraints to smallholder agriculture in the developing world. A significant distinction between BREAD and other NSF

programs is that proposals to BREAD must make a clear and well-defined connection between the outcomes of the proposed basic research and its direct relevance and potential application to agriculture in the developing world. The BREAD Program takes the activities of the Plant Genome Research Program (PGRP) to the next level by supporting a broader range of scientific research and by enabling funding to be allocated to international collaborators through subawards. The Program's focus is on novel, transformative basic research at the proof-of-concept stage rather than its application or development. Especially encouraged are original proposals that address major constraints to the productivity of crops important to smallholder farmers, or on the development of novel and efficient production practices. Although the Program places an initial emphasis on crop improvement, it will also consider innovative basic research proposals from scientists in all fields of research in the biological and physical sciences and engineering as long as the proposed research is consistent with the Program objectives. Up to \$12 million is anticipated to be available for funding to this program for FY 2012.

California Farmland Conservancy Program (CFCP)

The California Farmland Conservancy Program (CFCP) is a statewide grant funding program that supports local efforts to establish agricultural conservation easements and planning projects for the purpose of preserving important agricultural land resources. The CFCP provides grants to local governments and qualified non-profit organizations. The Department of Conservation's California Farmland Conservancy Program provides grants to local governments and qualified nonprofit organizations for the following purposes: 1) voluntary acquisition of conservation easements on agricultural lands that are under pressure of being converted to non-agricultural uses; 2) temporary purchase of agricultural lands that are under pressure of being converted to non-agricultural uses, as a phase in the process of placing agricultural conservation easements on farmland; 3) agricultural land conservation policy and planning projects; and 4) restoration of and improvements to agricultural land already under easement

Simply Organic 1% Grant

The Simply Organic 1% fund supports and promotes the growth of organic and sustainable agriculture. The types of projects they support include: research into organic production methods and crop improvement; educating farmers on

organic growing techniques, certification standards and documentation; educating the public on the value of organic agriculture; and developing projects that help organic farmers to be more efficient, produce better products, and add value to their products. They evaluate grant requests based on the following criteria: how well it meets the goals of the SO1% fund; cost vs. benefit of the project; the goals, values, reputation, and track record of the organization making the request; recommendations from others in the organic community; and thoroughness and professionalism of application (all requested information provided, typed document, specific monetary request, details on how the money will be used, clear and understandable presentation, etc.)

Second Chance Fund

The Second Chance Fund is set up to give animal victims of abuse or neglect a second chance at life. Financial assistance is provided, in select cases, to animal welfare organizations and rescue groups responsible for the temporary care of animals as they are prepared for adoption into permanent, loving homes. Funding to any one agency is limited to \$2,000 per fiscal year. Only animal sheltering agencies (private or public) and rescue groups are considered for the Second Chance Fund. Individuals, businesses and corporations are not provided for in the guidelines of the fund.

Applicants to the ASPCA Disaster Fund must be a nonprofit organization or government agency (such as a municipal or county animal control) with an animal welfare mission and a federal tax ID (Employer Identification Number); a qualified shelter and/or other animal welfare organization in states affected by or responding to recent severe weather incidents, or organizations outside those states providing outreach and assistance; directly affected by or provid-

ing/participating in direct response to the spring 2011 natural disasters; and in need of immediate assistance.

The Shubert Foundation

The Shubert Foundation is dedicated to sustaining and advancing the live performing arts in the United States, with a particular emphasis on theatre and a secondary focus on dance. In service of this mission, we provide general operating support to not-for-profit, professional resident theatre and dance companies, as well as some arts-related organizations that help support their development. Grant recipients must have track records of artistic achievement, administrative strength and fiscal responsibility. The Shubert Foundation funds programs in the areas of Theatre, Dance, Arts Related Organizations, Education, and Human Services. The program areas of Arts Related Organizations and Education are smaller than those of Theatre and Dance and necessarily limited. The Shubert Foundation awards unrestricted grants for general operating support, rather than funding for specific projects. These grants are awarded exclusively to US organizations, which must have current 501(c)(3) tax-exempt status in order to be eligible for funding. The deadline for Dance, Arts Related and Education application is October 17, 2011. The deadline for Theatre applications is December 1, 2011.

Museums for America

Museums for America (MFA) is the largest grant program for museums at IMLS. The goal of MFA is to strengthen the ability of a museum to serve the public more effectively by supporting high-priority activities that advance the institution's mission and strategic goals. Applicants can apply for projects in one of the following three categories: 1) Engaging Communities (Education, Exhibitions, and Interpretation); 2) Building Institutional Capacity (Management, Policy, and Training); and 3) Collections Stewardship (Management of Collections). Fiscal year (FY) 2012 MFA funding will support projects and activities that strengthen museums as active resources for lifelong learning and as important institutions in the establishment of livable communities. MFA grants can fund either new or ongoing museum activities and programs, such as improvement of institutional infrastructure; planning; management of collec-

tions; public access; professional development; purchase of equipment or services; research and scholarship; school and public programming; exhibitions; training; or efforts of museums to upgrade and integrate new technologies into their overall institutional effectiveness.

NEA Research: Art Works

The NEA will make grants for research projects that use existing datasets to mine data for analyses of the value and impact of the U.S. arts sector on the nation, whether on individuals or communities. Applications should present novel research questions that have not previously been explored with the referenced dataset(s). Projects that will be conducted in partnership with for-profit entities, and/or which use commercial and/or administrative datasets, are also encouraged. The agency has determined that all grants awarded under this category will have the following as their primary outcome: "Enhancing knowledge and understanding: *Evidence of the value and impact of the arts is expanded and promoted.*" Organizations will be asked to address the anticipated results of their projects in their applications. If a grant is received, grantees will be asked to report their findings in their final report. Before applying, please review the reporting requirements on the National Endowment for the Arts Final Descriptive Report form and the "Administrative Requirements" for information about a final work product research report. In the first year of the program, funds will be given only for the analysis of high-quality datasets. In future years, it may be possible for applicants to submit requests for projects involving primary data collection.

Sustaining Cultural Heritage Collections

Sustaining Cultural Heritage Collections (SCHC) helps cultural institutions meet the complex challenge of preserving large and diverse holdings of humanities materials for future generations by supporting preventive conservation measures that mitigate deterioration and prolong the useful life of collections. To preserve and ensure continued access to such collections, institutions must implement preventive conservation measures, which encompass managing relative humidity, temperature, light, and pollutants in collection spaces; providing protective storage enclosures and systems for collections; and safeguarding collections from theft and from natural and man-made disasters. This program helps cultural repositories plan and implement preservation strategies that pragmatically balance effectiveness, cost, and environmental impact. To help institutions develop sound preventive conservation projects, NEH encourages collaborative and interdisciplinary planning, which is important for identifying sustainable strategies. Such planning should include consideration of the following factors: the nature of the materials in a collection; the performance of the building, its envelope, and its systems in moderating internal environmental conditions; the capabilities of the institution; the nature of the local climate and the effects of climate change; the cost-effectiveness and energy efficiency of various approaches to preventive conservation; and the project's impact on the environment. Sustaining Cultural Heritage Collections offers two kinds of awards: grants for planning and for implementation. The maximum grant for planning applications is \$50,000 and the maximum grant for implementation grants is \$350,000.

Energy Innovation Fund – Multifamily Pilot Program

The primary purpose of the Program is to stimulate innovative approaches for increasing the energy efficiency of existing multifamily residential properties that can be replicated by others. HUD expects that outcomes of the Program will include: 1) Reduced energy consumption in multifamily residential properties, with resulting savings for fami-

lies, property owners, and in some cases the Federal government, and lower greenhouse gas emissions. 2) Increased private investment to support energy efficiency in such properties. 3) Green jobs in construction, property management, and technical analysis (e.g., energy audits, building commissioning), including job opportunities for low-income people. 4) Acquisition and analysis of data on the costs, benefits, challenges, and opportunities associated with retrofitting such properties. 5) Approaches for retrofitting such properties that can be scaled up, applied more widely and adopted by other parties. 6) Approaches that propose solutions to the disparity among the parties when their financial or other interests are not the same, such as the difference in perspective when utilities are paid only by the ownership or only by the tenants, i.e., the so-called "split incentives" issue. A total of \$25 million is available through this funding opportunity.

Small Business Innovation Research Program Phase I

The Small Business Innovation Research (SBIR) Program stimulates technological innovation in the private sector by strengthening the role of small business concerns in meeting Federal research and development needs, increasing the commercial application of federally supported research results, and fostering and encouraging participation by socially and economically disadvantaged and women-owned small businesses. The SBIR program solicits proposals from the small business sector consistent with NSF's mission. A main purpose of the legislation is to stimulate technological innovation and increase private sector commercialization. The NSF SBIR program is therefore in a unique position to meet both the goals of NSF and the purpose of the SBIR legislation by transforming scientific discovery into both social and economic benefit, and by emphasizing private sector commercialization. Accordingly, NSF has formulated broad sollicita-

tion topics for SBIR that conform to the high-technology investment sector's interests. The four broad topics are:

- Biological and Chemical Technologies (BC)
- Education Applications (EA)
- Electronics, Information and Communication Technologies (EI)
- Nanotechnology, Advanced Materials, and Manufacturing (NM)

Proposals submitted outside the window of November 2, 2011 – December 2, 2011 will be returned without review.

Project School Emergency Response to Violence (SERV)

This program funds short-term and long-term education-related services for local educational agencies (LEAs) and institutions of higher education (IHEs) to help them recover from a violent or traumatic event in which the learning environment has been disrupted. H-1B Technical Skills Training Grants

Water Sustainability and Climate
