Smoke Alarm Safety







Fire is the third leading cause of accidental death in the home. The risk of dying in a fire is twice as high in a home without smoke alarms. Just because you can't see the fire doesn't mean your still not in danger, small fires can create enough smoke to fill up your home with a deadly amount. Most fatal fires occur between the hours of 2-6AM, while most people are sleeping. The smell of smoke may not wake you and you could be breathing in noxious gas that will put you into a deeper sleep.

WHERE TO PUT THEM:

It is suggested that a smoke alarm be in every level of the home, however it is highly recommended they be in every room! Places to install alarms: *main hallways, *inside bedrooms (if not inside right outside of bedrooms doors), *top of stairways, *near kitchens, *bottom of basement stairwell (being able to hear the alarms before stairs are blocked by fire.)



Once a smoke alarm goes off you have on average 7 minutes to get out before smoke and fire overtake the home or structure.



Household Hazardous Waste: What it is... Where to take it... Who to call...

Household hazardous waste is "any hazardous waste generated in owning or maintaining a place of residence." The optimum solution is to minimize the generation of hazardous waste through the adoption of safer alternatives. Hazardous wastes discarded from homes may threaten human health or the environment when disposed of improperly. Many people don't realize it, but there are a lot of common household items that are considered hazardous. Including medications, paint, motor oil, antifreeze, auto batteries, lawn care products, pest control products, drain cleaners, pool care products (chlorine and acids), & household cleaners. Some household cleaners may be harmful separately or when combined, such as ammonia and bleach.

Drowning Prevention

Month



Children age 4 & under are at a higher risk of drowning than any other age group. Almost 300 kids 4 & under drown each year in home swimming pools. Of all toddlers who drown, 70 percent are in the care of one or both parents at the time of the drowning & 77 percent are missing from sight for five minutes or less. For every 1 child who drowns, 4 are hospitalized for near drowning. 46% of the victims were last seen in the house; 23% were last seen in the yard or porch/patio; & 31% were in or around the pool before the accident. In all, 69% of the children were not expected to be at or in the pool, yet they were found in the water.

A swimming pool is 14 times more likely than a motor vehicle to be involved in the death of a child age 4 and under. Child drowning is a silent death.

There's no splashing to alert anyone that the child is in trouble.



Poolside safety tips:

- *Adults <u>only</u> should be watching the kids undistracted-No cell phones, magazines, playing cards, etc.
- *Children of any age should **NEVER** be asked to watch another child (sibling, cousin, friend)
- *With young children <u>DO NOT</u> use air filled or foam toys (water wings, noodles, inner tubes) in place of life jackets.
- *Access to the pool or spa should be limited by locked gates, locked doors, windows that are self closing, self latching gates on any fences surrounding the pool.
- *Keep toys out of the pool and away from the pool area.
- *Latches on gates/windows/doors should be above the reach of children.

*DO NOT ALLOW ANYONE TO SWIM ALONE.

In 2004; 3,308 unintentional drowning occurred. Almost 9 people per day, (not including 676 fatalities) from other causes, boating accidents, etc.)

DIAL 9-1-1 IN CASE OF AN EMERGENCY It could save your life or someone you love!

9-1-1 is able to answer calls for the deaf & hearing impaired. **9-1-1** can also help if you do not speak English. What is 9-1-1? In the event of an emergency dialing 9-1-1 will connect you to a central communications center where they will assist you in sending out emergency responders, fire department, police officers, or an ambulance. When to call 9-1-1:

- *if you witness or are the victim of a crime *if you witness or involved in a serious accident
- *if there is an emergency illness or suspected poisoning *if there is a child/senior citizen/handicapped person that is lost, confused, frightened, or needs special assistance. *if there is a serious injury, someone is unconscious, not breathing, bleeding, or having a bad reaction to a bite/sting
