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Fontana Days Parade will take place on June 4 in downtown area

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One of the biggest highlights of the annual Fontana Days celebration will be the parade on Saturday, June 4. The parade will start at 11 a.m. at the corner of Sierra Avenue and Arrow Boulevard and will proceed south to Merrill Avenue.

Hot enough for you? It's gonna get worse

The heat wave that arrived in Inland Southern California on Thursday is expected to peak Friday and Saturday, with triple-digit temperatures all around.

An excessive heat warning is in effect for the valleys and deserts, and even the mountains below 6,000 feet are under a heat advisory.

Things started to sizzle Thursday, with high temperatures of 99 in Chino, 97 in San Bernardino and Redlands, and 96 in Ontario and Rancho Cucamonga, according to the National Weather Service. Lake Arrowhead got up to 88 and Big Bear Lake to 78.

Temperatures Friday morning were well into the 80s by 9 a.m., and it was only going to get worse from there. Afternoon temperatures are expected to range from 100-105 around the Inland valleys, while Saturday will be 99-105.

The high-pressure system responsible for the excessive heat is expected to leave on Sunday, dropping temperatures into the 90s. By Monday, the area will be back in the 80s.

During the heat wave, the weather service is advising people to postpone outdoor work if possible, or wear lightweight clothing and have plenty of water on hand if time must be spent outdoors.

The San Bernardino County Department of Public Health said in a news release that those most vulnerable to the heat are the elderly, children and infants, those with chronic health conditions and those who work outside.

Inland residents aren't strangers to hundred-degree temperatures, but the forecast is for temperatures 15 to 20 degrees above the average for early June, weather service meteorologists said.

The afternoon highs will contrast with nighttime lows in the high 50s and low 60s, according to the weather service.

Coastal regions are protected by the marine layer and won't have it so hot.

Western re-enactment performers Abigail Hawks and her fiancé, Luke Short, are going up to Oro Grande, east of Adelanto in the High Desert, for an event over the weekend. Back in the 1800s, people tried to protect themselves from the sun with conservative clothing to maintain their pale skin.

Avoiding a tan might not be Hawks' priority this weekend, though.

"I don't know, I might be going with a little shorter-sleeved outfit," she said. Short might avoid the petticoat that makes up part of his costume.

The two have lived in the area all their lives and said that temperatures didn't typically get much higher than what is predicted for the weekend.

Still, they said, it could be worse.

"At least we get a breeze here," Hawkins said. "Arizona is much worse."
