Fire Officials Demonstrate Defensible Space Homes

A defensible home is one that has the greatest potential for surviving a wildfire. Specifically, defensible space around a home is the required space between a structure and the wildland area that, under normal conditions, creates a sufficient buffer to slow or halt the spread of wildfire to a structure.

On June 2nd, hundreds of residents attended a fire wise Community Demonstration Open House in Mt. Baldy or Wrightwood. San Bernardino County Fire Fuel Reduction Crews removed over 20 tons of material (overgrown brush, tree branches, dead trees, etc.) to create a defensible space around the structure and property, bringing the property in compliance with the County fire fuels reduction ordinance. In 2011, there were seven demonstration homes in the mountain communities, with over 83 tons of fire fuels removed.

On the day of the event, representatives from County Code Enforcement, Hazardous Tree Removal Program, County Fire Fuels Reduction Crews, and Forest Care take citizens around the property and show them what was done to bring the property into compliance and how they can reduce fire fuels on their property. Before photos are displayed throughout the property, showing the fuel reduction to that location.

Two weeks after a home demonstration event, County Fire Fuel Reduction Crews go through the targeted community with chipper trucks and chip all material left at the curb at no cost to the homeowner. Demonstration homes are being planned for the communities of Arrowbear, Lake Arrowhead, Deerlodge Park, Green Valley Lake, Big Bear and Lytle Creek. Dates and locations are forthcoming.
