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

USING THE 911 SYSTEM APPROPRIATELY

As COVID-19 cases continue to rise in San Bernardino County, our local hospitals are anticipating an increase in emergency room visits from the public; as such, this may also cause a strain on the 9-1-1 system. Calling 911 and being transported by an ambulance does not guarantee a member of the public a COVID19 test or a frontline spot in the emergency room. All patients transported to local area hospitals are triaged based on the severity of the injury and signs and symptoms.

Showing Symptoms?

To alleviate excess 9-1-1 calls, if you are exhibiting flu-like symptoms, we recommend the following prior to calling 9-1-1.
