## CAJON PASS: 1 dead, 2 injured in 15 freeway crash Saturday night

CAJON PASS, Calif. (VVNG.com) — One person was killed Saturday night following a crash on the 15 freeway.

The California Highway Patrol and **San Bernardino County Fire** received reports of a two vehicle crash at 11:36 PM on the southbound 15 freeway, between Oak Hill Road and Highway 138.

According to CHP logs, a brown box-shaped SUV side-swiped a black Prius, then flew off the side of the freeway about half-mile north of the runaway truck ramp, CHP logs reported.

The Prius came to a rest near the entrance of the runaway truck ramp. Two people sustained minor injuries.

Firefighters made their way to the brown boxed-shaped suv, which was about 200 feet off the side of the freeway, and located only the driver inside. They were pronounced deceased on scene.

A child's car seat was also found in the brown vehicle, and as a precaution the CHP helicopter did a flyover of the crash scene using their infrared lighting and confirmed there were no other victims.

All lanes of traffic were closed while authorities conducted an investigation.

The name of the deceased has not been released.

HESPERIA, Calif. (VVNG.com) — For the second time this weekend, and less than 2 miles apart, a pedestrian was struck by a vehicle on Bear Valley Road.

The latest hit-and-run happened August 4, 2019, at about 8:30 pm in the 15500 block of Bear Valley Road, just east of Cypress Avenue in Hesperia.

Hesperia sheriff's deputies responded to the incident along with San Bernardino County Fire.

The pedestrian was critically injured and firefighters requested helicopter Reach H325 to land on the helipad at Desert Valley Hospital.

The pedestrian was airlifted to Arrowhead Regional Medical Center with life-threatening injuries.

Kat Jovel witnessed the incident and told Victor Valley News the pedestrian was a male in his late 50's and he was barely breathing.

Jovel said the truck that hit the pedestrian didn't stop. "There was another truck that drove over him as he was laying in the middle lane. So my husband started redirecting traffic to other lanes as I was on the phone with police," she said.

Jovel said the second truck pulled over to check on the pedestrian.

A California Highway Patrol helicopter that was already in the area assisted deputies with aerial support in conducting a search for the suspect. At this time it's unknown if the driver was later apprehended.

Eastbound traffic on Bear Valley Road was detoured at Cypress Avenue as deputies searched the roadway for evidence and investigated the collision.

Information on the pedestrian or a possible suspect vehicle were not available.

## SUPPLY KITS FOR SURRENDERED BABIES AT FIRE STATIONS

California law allows parents of newborn babies to safely surrender their babies at hospitals and fire stations. The law's intent is to save the lives of newborn infants at risk of abandonment by encouraging parents to safely surrender the infant within 72 hours of birth, with no questions asked. The most recent statistics show that 931 babies have been surrendered in California between 2001 and 2017. Loma Linda Children's Hospital recently donated clothing and supply kits to the **San Bernardino County Fire** Department to ensure that infants who are surrendered at fire stations can be properly cared for until they are delivered to hospitals. The supply kits include a onesie, benie, blanket, and newborn diapers.
