## Event for National Day of Service and Remembrance will take place in Fontana on Sept.

The ceremonial ringing of the bell is conducted by the San Bernardino County Fire Department to honor fallen firefighters. The National Day of Service and Remembrance ceremony will be held in Fontana this year on Sept. 7.

Local residents are invited to participate in the Sept. 11 National Day of Service and Remembrance event in Fontana.

The annual event will take place on Saturday, Sept. 7 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the Fontana Community Senior Center, 16710 Ceres Avenue.

The ceremony is being coordinated by Veterans Partnering With Communities, an organization based in Fontana.

The **San Bernardino County Fire** Department's Honor Guard will conduct the ringing of the bell ceremony to honor the fallen firefighters who served bravely during the Sept. 11 attacks in 2001.

Vendors wishing to attend the event are encouraged to register by calling (909) 355-3036.

"We are also seeking volunteers and donations from the public of non-perishable food items, coffee packs, hot sauce packs, non-breakable (no glass) items, hygiene items, snacks such as granola bars, writing materials, books, magazines, and socks," said Danny Marquez, the event organizer.

After the ceremony, individual community volunteers and organizations will organizing the donated items and putting together as many military care packages as possible. Marquez said the group's goal is to create 600 total care packages, which will be sent to military members.

"We will have a kids' table and letter writing table for letters and pictures of support for our troops being placed in every package," Marquez said.

#### Fire burns about 15 acres in Little Mountain area of San Bernardino

A two-alarm vegetation fire burned about 15 acres in the Little Mountain area of San Bernardino on Sept. 4, according to the **San Bernardino County Fire** Department.

No reports of injuries to firefighters or civilians were reported, said Battalion Chief Mike McClintock.

At 7:17 p.m., San Bernardino County Fire crews were dispatched to the area of 36th and G Streets. Due to the dry grass, slope and low humidity, the fire quickly spread up nearby Little Mountain.

With the fire rapidly extending upward toward homes, a second alarm was quickly struck to bring more resources to battle the fire and to provide for structure defense for nearby homes on Ridgeline Drive. The forward rate of spread was stopped in about 35 minutes.

Due to the quick actions by initial crews and residents providing a defensible space, no homes were damaged or destroyed by the quick moving fire. Damage was limited to rear fences, trees and ornamental vegetation.

Crews continued to work on mop-up and permitter control throughout the evening. The cause of the fire is under investigation.

#### Sheriff's Aviation rescues injured hiker from Mt. Baldy

On Saturday, Aug. 17, Sheriff's Aviation's 40King6 and Sheriff's Air Rescue 306 helicopter crews rescued hiker Maria Martinez, 30, of Rancho Cucamonga from Mount Baldy after she was injured.

According to a sheriff's department press release, at approximately 11 a.m., Sheriff's Aviation, based at San Bernardino International Airport, was requested by **San Bernardino County Fire**, in reference to an injured hiker in the Mount Baldy area.

Sheriff's patrol helicopter, 40King6, responded to the area and began a search for the victim. The victim had also activated her GPS Spot device, which sent a location to the Office of Emergency Services. That information was given to Sheriff's Aviation and was helpful in locating the victim. Once 40King6 arrived in the area, the crew located the injured hiker at approximately the 9,000 foot elevation level. Due to the location and terrain 40King6 requested Sheriff's Air Rescue 306 to perform a hoist rescue.

Air Rescue 306 arrived in the area and lowered a medic to contact the victim. Once the medic was on the ground, he advised Air Rescue 306 the injured hiker had an injury to her ankle. The medic placed the victim into a rescue harness and Air Rescue 306 hovered above the victim and hoisted her to the helicopter followed by the medic. The victim had non-life threatening injuries and was transported to a waiting ambulance.
