Evacuation Terminology

The terms "voluntary" and "mandatory" are often incorrectly used to describe evacuations. Regionally, fire agencies and law enforcement will use the terms Evacuation Order, Evacuation Warning, and Shelter-In-Place to alert you to the significance of the danger and provide basic instructions.

Evacuation Order

Leave now! Evacuate immediately, do not delay gathering belongings or prepare your home. Follow any directions provided in the evacuation order.

Evacuation Warning

Alerting of community members in a defined area of a potential threat to life and property from an emergency incident. Be prepared to evacuate.

If you receive an Evacuation Warning, gather your family, pets and emergency supplies and be prepared to leave. For those who know they would be unable to evacuate quickly, consider leaving when a Evacuation Warning is issued. If you know you need assistance evacuating, don't wait until an Evacuation Order is issued, ask now.

Shelter in Place

Stay in your current location or the safest nearby building or unburnable area. May be required when evacuation isn't necessary or is too dangerous
