Earth Day Celebrates 40 years!

Earth Day was founded by Gaylord Nelson, a United States Senator from Wisconsin.

Responding to widespread environmental degradation the event called for an environmental teach-in, or Earth Day, to be held on April 22, 1970. Over 20 million people participated that year, and Earth Day is now observed on April 22 each year by more than 500 million people and several national governments in 175 countries.

to organize 20 million demonstrators and the thousands of schools and local communities that participated. That was the remarkable thing about Earth Day. It organized itself."

Make Earth Day Every Day at your school, business and your residence by doing one or more of the following:

- © reduce your usage of plastic bags-use reusable bags when shopping.
- © conserve paper by using both sides of a page in your notebooks and printer; buy recycled paper and make sure there is a paper recycling bin next to your trash can.
- © plant a tree a single tree will absorb one ton of carbon dioxide over its lifetime. Shade provided by trees can reduce your air conditioning bill by 10-15%. Consider growing fruit trees or plant

Green Ideas

It's easy to liven up your table by nestling a few pressed leaves between two sheer tablecloths, as shown at the right. A few days before the party, snip several leaves from a garden or houseplant, and place them between the pages of a large book, protecting the book with sheets of tissue paper. After 48 hours, remove the leaves and randomly scatter them between the cloths, making sure to leave empty spaces for the place settings.



Boston ferns are shown here but other leaves such as palm, basil or ivy works just as well.

a garden so that you can eat what you grow and avoid trips to the grocery store. Compost or vermicompost your table scraps to reduce landfill waste and help your garden thrive.

© turn off lights when you leave a room and keep the thermostat at 70 degrees or lower in cold weather months, 78 degrees or higher in the warm weather months. You can save about 3% on heating costs for every degree you reduce your thermostat setting. Turn down your water heater or purchase an Energy Star water heater. Water heating accounts for about 13% of home energy costs. Contact your local energy company for tips. Enable your computer monitor's energy saving features when in use. Turn off your computer equipment

- at night and at other times when not in use.
- ⑤ leave your car at home at least one day a week. If you can cut your vehicle miles traveled by just 5% through combining trips, walking, biking, or taking public transportation, you can save up to \$100 per year on gasoline costs. You can also reduce one pound of greenhouse gas emissions by eliminating just one mile of driving.
- help reduce your carbon footprint by reusing a water bottle to eliminate waste. If residents purchased a water filtration system for their tap water instead of buying bottled water, they would substantially reduce environmental costs. Manufacturing aluminum, plastic and glass containers from raw materials requires enormous

- amounts of energy, resulting in massive carbon emissions. But making containers from recycled materials uses far less energy 95% less in the case of aluminum cans.
- © recycling California Refund Value (CRV) beverage containers is one of the easiest things people can do to live sustainably. Recycling conserves resources and saves energy. Think about this: A California family of four, on average, will consume more than 2,000 CRV beverage containers in one year, worth more than \$100 in CRV.

In the first six months of 2008, Californians recycled 7.6 billion bottles and cans. In terms of energy savings, that's like taking 263,000 cars off the road for a year!

Spotlight: Chaparral High School, Phelan



Chaparral High School ASB cleans up the Campus

Students, teachers, and administrators at Chaparral High School had been noticing a large amount of waste during the past several years especially when it came to aluminum cans. Many thought that the removal of the campus soda machines in 2008 would resolve this issue and improve the school's eco footprint at the same time. However, after observing that students bring their cans and many plastic bottles to school from their homes, the Associated Student Body (ASB) requested a recycling



container from the County of San Bernardino Solid Waste Management Division and received a recycling station with six 32-gallon collection bins.

Since receiving the recycling station, ASB students have worked with the general student body as well as the custodial staff to ensure that cans and bottles from classrooms, the cafeteria, and other office locations are collected and recycled in the station.

As a result, ASB is capturing about \$80 dollars per week.
This money goes into the ASB fund and the money itself is recycled into meaningful opportunities for all students at the end of the year; parties and barbeques or



sports equipment for intramural sports on campus.

Research conducted by Chaparral ASB students found: "The 35 billion aluminum cans sent to landfills last year had a scrap value of more the \$600 million. (Some day we'll be mining our landfills for the resources we've buried)".) www.oberlin.edu/recyle/facts.html

Also, "recycling one aluminum, can saves enough energy to run a 100-watt bulb for 20 hours, a computer for three hours, or a TV for two hours". *EPA*, 2008



Finally, "recycling aluminum saves 95% of the energy needed to produce new aluminum from raw materials. Energy saved from recycling one ton of aluminum is equal to the amount of electricity the average home uses over 10 years." *Keep America Beautiful, 2006.*
