The following report presents an overview of accomplishments and successes achieved through First 5 San Bernardino's (F5SB) funded initiatives during fiscal year 2022-2023 in each of the three Strategic Priority Areas of the 2020-2023 Strategic Plan:

Child Health

Children prenatal through age 5 and their families can access the full spectrum of health and behavioral health services needed to enhance their well-being.

Family Supports

Families and communities are engaged, supported and strengthened through effective resources and opportunities that assist them in nurturing, caring and providing for their children's success and well-being.

Early Learning

Children from birth to age 5 benefit from high quality early childhood care and education, family engagement and support that prepares all children to reach their optimal potential in school and life.

This report is organized by Strategic Priority Areas. The list of corresponding initiatives includes a narrative summary and the corresponding data for fiscal year 2022-2023. Systemwide strategies are also identified for each initiative: Prevention efforts: A focus on prevention strategies through outreach campaigns, provider trainings and

The NAEBOR Clinic's mission is to develop an obstetric clinic tailored to the needs of the Black community, offer patient-centered and individualized care and improve pregnancy outcomes and patient experiences. This year, the clinic not only had seven healthy babies born, but left lasting impacts on the mothers. Seventy-five percent of the mothers who were seen at the clinic were free from hypertensive issues, which are related to poor birth outcomes for African American/Black mothers, and 75 percent of the mothers also elected to breastfeed.

Parent Success Story

A mom started in the Nurturing Families program in 2019 when she had a 3-year-old and a 9-year-old. She came to Big Bear to escape from one of the most violent and poorest places in Mexico. She arrived not knowing the language or the place, but with the huge desire to learn and improve herself, especially as a mom. By following program recommendations, she learned to listen, be more patient and be fully present with her kids. In 2021, she had twins and continued to be active in classes including bringing her twins to weekly "Mommy and Me" classes. She has spread the word about Nurturing Families in Big Bear's Hispanic community and thanks to her, other families have been helped.

Provider Success Story

A family child care (FCC) provider was enrolled in Child Care Resource Center's Spanish FCC apprenticeship when she learned about Quality Start San Bernardino (QSSB). She wanted to improve her teaching indoor environment and create additional activity centers within her program but encountered challenges as the existing space was limited. After discussing a variety of options with her QSSB coach, the provider successfully created a new math center with the capacity for additional centers in her indoor and outdoor environments. By the end of the program year, she had completed the FCC apprenticeship program by completing 12 early childhood education units with an 'A' and received her associate teacher permit.

Systems Level Efforts and Integration

Within each of the Strategic Priority Areas, First 5 San Bernardino maintained a commitment to systems-level efforts: collaboration, community capacity building and workforce.

- **Collaboration:** Ensuring that families, providers and stakeholders collaborate effectively to improve the well-being of the child.
- **Community Capacity Building:** Ensuring that community organizations and groups are equipped to effectively serve children and families.
- Workforce: Ensuring that the workforce is developed to effectively serve children and families.

The systems-level approach means that multiple partners over various sectors came together to support children and families in San Bernardino County through collaboration and shared learning. Examples of system's level efforts include workforce development, funding opportunity collaboration, cross-disciplinary collaboration and/or direct service to families. First 5 San Bernardino played an integral role in supporting or even facilitating many of these partnerships because we recognized that many of the collaborative partnerships supported by the Commission cross multiple sectors related to whole child wellness.

Workforce Sectors and Transdisciplinary Fields

First 5 San Bernardino understands the importance of the foundation of all future development and engages in the system integration network of workforce sectors that touch the life of a child to address the needs of children ages 0-5 and their families.

The array of agencies and diverse workforce partners include but are not limited to the following sectors: behavioral health, Black infant and maternal health, child welfare, clinics/hospitals, community-based organizations, county government, developmental disabilities/neurodivergent agencies, early care and education, early intervention, faith-based organizations, family support/resource centers, health centers, healthcare/managed care, home visiting, pediatric health care, philanthropic foundations, judicial system, maternal, child and adolescent health, mental and behavioral health, policy, public health and universities/community colleges.

F5SB invests in and elevates the competency level of the transdisciplinary fields in SBC through training and professional development to everyone those who touches the lives of developing children ages 0-5 and their families, and can promote social and emotional support.

The range of transdisciplinary providers includes but is not limited to administrative staff, behavioral and early childhood interventionists, caregivers, case managers, clinical research specialists, community health workers and health navigators, counselors, doulas, early care education providers, health care providers, home visitors, infant and early child mental health consultants, lactation consultants, law enforcement and safety personnel, medical residents, mental health professionals, midwives, nurses, parents, pediatricians, preschool teachers, promotoras, registered dieticians, resource parents, therapists/ social workers and WIC workers.





Community Engagement

In fiscal year 2022-2023, First 5 San Bernardino continued its efforts for community engagement through outreach events, strategic communications and marketing campaigns. The key highlights of community engagement efforts and marketing campaigns are detailed below.

Community Outreach Events

The F5SB Community Engagement Specialist participated in 51 community outreach events that occurred throughout the fiscal year 2022-2023 (e.g., community-focused, educational, etc.). Some types of organizations that coordinated the outreach events that F5SB participated in were day care centers, family resource centers, law enforcement and community-based organizations. Outreach events included Back to School, National Night Out, Trunk or Treat, Breastfeeding Week and literacy events. These outreach events were another opportunity for F5SB to interact with families in the community and provide families with promotional and resource items for their children, such as First 5 California's Kits for New Parents, pencils, crayons, books, oral health kits, spoon sets and paint sets. Through these community outreach events, F5SB engaged with nearly 10,000 parents by providing resources and promotional items.





Gift a Kid a Book Campaign

In November and December 2022, First 5 San Bernardino, in partnership with Westbound Communications, launched a San Bernardino County-based bilingual (English/Spanish) Gift a Kid a Book campaign to bring awareness to the importance of literacy and early learning for children under 5 years old. The campaign consisted of advertising in strategic locations, geotargeted digital/social media, interactive giveaways on social media and campaign events. Three campaign events were implemented in the Valley, High Desert and Mountain regions held respectively at Kordyak Elementary, Victor Elementary School District Family Resource Center and North Shore Elementary. These events encouraged San Bernardino County residents with children ages 0-5 years old to participate in reading and building home libraries to develop literacy and early learning in developing children.

The campaign had an estimated reach of 500,000 parents and caregivers through out of home advertising, achieved an audience of 1.81 million through events and media coverage through 21 different pieces including KABC LA Channel 7 news and newspapers in the Southern California News Group. The digital marketing campaign performed exceptionally well delivering 3.5 times the industry average in digital advertising, receiving 1 million+ digital impressions, 2,941 conversions, a .29% click through rate and 1,210 Snapchat swipes.




























Little Teeth, Big Responsibility Campaign – Recipient of 2023 NACo Achievement Award

In February 2023, First 5 San Bernardino collaborated for the second year with San Bernardino County Department of Public Health local oral health program, Smile SBC, to launch the bilingual (English/ Spanish) Little Teeth, Big Responsibility campaign. This campaign, launched during National Children's Dental Health Month, emphasized the importance of oral hygiene for children ages 0-5 and served as a call to action for parents and caregivers to practice daily, responsible dental hygiene for their children.

The campaign consisted of an advertising campaign with billboards, broadcast and geotargeted web and social media ads as well as a school event to generate media coverage. Informative information was shared on F5SB and Smile SBC's websites to complement the advertising campaign. The campaign delivered more than 24 million impressions and our digital media efforts received three times the industry average. The click through rate (to our website) was .25% resulting in 5,394 conversions and 2,294 Snapchat swipes. A recap video was created to showcase the campaign and the media-centric event held at E. Neal Roberts Elementary School in San Bernardino.

Another goal was to increase traffic to www.SmileSBC .org "Find a Dentist" web page to connect the public to nearby dentists for care appointments. A noticeable uptick representing 3,000 new users to the website was a direct result of campaign efforts. The campaign also received a 2023 Achievement Award from the National Association of Counties in the health category.











Kid Safe Summer Campaign

First 5 San Bernardino launched another flagship campaign in May 2023 supporting the Child Health Strategic Priority Area called Kid Safe Summer. This bilingual, four-month campaign ran from May through August promoting summer safety among San Bernardino County families in both English and Spanish. Hot temperatures, fun in the water and summer vacation present a new set of dangers for kids that aren't as prevalent in other seasons. F5SB released a collection of educational tools, tips and resources to help parents and caregivers keep little ones safe this summer.

Kid Safe Summer was divided into three categories of safety: water, sun and on-the-move. To create mass awareness of the safety messages throughout the county, the new campaign included ads on local radio stations, targeted digital and social media to reach parents and caregivers of children under 5, free educational webinars, and media relations efforts. A Kid Safe Summer landing page was created on our website sharing this crucial information. More than 5.2 million impressions were delivered during the campaign, 325,456 impressions over goal.

Water safety focused on drowning, the leading cause of injury-related deaths for children under 5 years old. In May, we took to the pool with KNBC Los Angeles Channel 4 and Spanish language Telemundo Channel 52 to share water safety tips. F5SB Executive Director Karen Scott and other water safety experts spoke about the ABCs of Water Safety, how to be an active water watcher and the proper use of a personal flotation device. An impressive 35 media segments were aired reaching an audience of 3.13 million.

More media coverage continued in August with a segment conducted in partnership with the San Bernardino County Sheriff's department airing on KABC Los Angeles Channel 7 during a heat wave that included F5SB messaging. In September, two live segments with SBC Department of Public Health aired on KTTV-FOX Good Day LA Channel 11 and demonstrated proper car seat installation, featuring F5SB messaging and graphics.

Further, in partnership with Loma Linda University Children's Hospital and Safe Kids IE, F5SB hosted a series of free, educational webinars in support of Kid Safe Summer initiatives. Dozens of parents and caretakers in San Bernardino County tuned in for informational sessions on head trauma, sun, water and car seat safety . The workshops remain available on demand at no cost at First5SanBernardino.org.
