3 killed, 1 airlifted in Highway 138 crash Thursday evening

PINON HILLS, Calif. (VVNG.com) — The California Highway Patrol is investigating a multi-vehicle crash that left three people dead and one other person critically injured Thursday evening.

The triple-fatal crash was reported at 7:37 PM on June 18, 2020, on SR-138 near Oasis Road in Pinon Hills.

According to CHP incident logs, the wheels on a silver sedan were smoking after the vehicle overturned and landed back on its wheels. People were attempting to get someone out of the vehicle.

San Bernardino County Fire responded to the scene and pronounced three people deceased at the scene.

Highway 138 was briefly closed in both directions to allow helicopter Reach 43 to land at the scene and subsequently airlift a patient with critical injuries to Loma Linda University Medical Center. A second person was evaluated at the scene but declined medical transportation.

The crash involved a burgundy Honda Accord, a silver Infiniti G35, the make/model on the third vehicle was unavailable at the time of the article.

INLAND EMPIRE – (INT) – **San Bernardino County fire** officials have borrowed a page of technology in hopes of slowing the nightly outburst of illegal fireworks.

Residents are encouraged to check out ‘The Illegal Fireworks Reporter’.

Informants can remain anonymous by accessing this platform through a QR code distributed throughout the county or online at SBCFire.org. Residents will be required to provide the date, time and location of the fireworks. Photos and videos are encouraged.

Investigators and law enforcement will respond.

Officials must have definitive proof of suspects’ activity.

First offenses carry a fine of \$1,250.

Redlands has gone a step further by enacting an ordinance that holds property owners, guardians and tenants liable for costs of public safety responses to fireworks calls.
