## Supervisor Rutherford Invites Residents for a Walk on the Pacific Electric Trail

Jan. 31, 2011 – RANCHO CUCAMONGA– San Bernardino County Second District Supervisor Janice Rutherford invites residents to join her for a walk on the Pacific Electric Trail in Rancho Cucamonga on Saturday, Feb. 5.

"I want to know what residents' priorities and concerns are, and the best way to do that is to get out and talk to them," Rutherford said. "E-mails and phones are good communication tools, but they cannot replace direct, face-to-face contact."

Supervisor Rutherford plans to invite residents to informal get-together events, such as walks around Second District points of interest and picnics at parks in the district, on a regular basis. The next get-together will take place Saturday, March 12 at Memorial Park in Upland.

"We're going to get out and enjoy the fresh air in some of the great family-friendly locations in the Second District," Rutherford said. "These events are going to be as informal as it gets. I want people to feel comfortable and ready to talk about anything that's on their mind."

The walk on Saturday will begin about 11 a.m. on the Pacific Electric Trail segment located on Milliken Avenue northwest of Central Park. Residents can park at Central Park, which is located at 11200 Base Line Road in Rancho Cucamonga.

The Pacific Electric Trail is a multi-use trail being developed along the right of way previously dedicated to the Pacific Electric Railroad, which ceased operation in the 1950s. The 27-mile trail stretches from Rialto to Montclair, traversing the cities of Fontana, Rancho Cucamonga, and Upland as well as a portion of unincorporated San Bernardino County.
