In September 2007, the San Bernardino County Homeless Partnership (SBCHP) was formed to provide a more focused approach to our goal of ending homelessness within the County. The Partnership consists of city governments, community based organizations, faith-based organizations, educational institutes, non-profit organizations, private industry, and federal, state, and local government.

SBCHP was developed to promote a strong collaboration between agencies to direct the planning, development, and implementation of the County’s 10-year-plan to end chronic homelessness. The Partnership meets on the third Wednesday of each month at the Behavioral Health Resource Center in Rialto. The Partnership facilitates better communication, planning, coordination, and cooperation among all entities that provide services and/or resources for the relief of homelessness in San Bernardino County.

Mission Statement

The Mission of the San Bernardino County Homeless Partnership is to provide a system of care that is inclusive, well planned, coordinated and evaluated and is accessible to all who are homeless and those at-risk of becoming homeless.

Interagency Council on Homelessness Homeless Provider Network Office of Homeless Services HPN Member News, Updates and Announcements	Don Smith	<p>News, Updates, and Announcements, -</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> On February 27th, 2019, the Interagency Council on Homelessness (ICH) approved a resolution authorizing the Office of Homeless Services (OHS) to utilize the financial interest earned on the \$9.3 million dollars in funding received from the State Homeless Emergency Aid Program (HEAP) award in order to establish a flexible housing subsidy fund to be administered by OHS on behalf of the CoC to provide emergency and gap funding assistance for unsheltered homeless individuals and families who may fall outside of the coordinated entry system prioritization process. <p>ICH also approved a resolution authorizing the OHS to assess and make recommendations on Coordinated Entry System policies for the prioritization of families with children. Currently there are no policies within the CoC for the prioritization of homeless families with children.</p> <p>The Sheriff's HOPE Team did a presentation on their ESRI data platform. The platform features an app – the Homeless Activity Reporter – which is available to the public and can be found on the HOPE team's website under programs. This app helps them locate, identify and keep track of homeless individuals and encampments throughout the county. The platform features a wealth of data on homeless population characteristics and trends</p> <p>Other news and updates from the ICH Meeting included: OHS sent tentative funding award letter to the agencies and organizations approved for HEAP funding. A day-long HEAP Orientation Meeting will be held on March 28th. OHS intends to distribute HEAP funding on a cash-flow basis with a tentative start date of May 1, 2019. The Housing Authority announced that they received over 17,000 new applications during open enrollment period to be added to the almost 50,000 already in the system. The Probation Department is conducting a Homeless Outreach event at four different sites in the City of San Bernardino to help probationers get connected to services.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> On February 20th, former County Supervisor now Assemblyman James Ramos announced a bill that he co-authored (AB 816) to create a Flexible Housing Program, similar to the HEAP funding, that will provide regional funding to address homelessness. The FHP will pool funding resources into a single program that regional homelessness agencies can access for a variety of housing options such as rental assistance, operating subsidies for housing developments, re-housing, case management and wrap around services. A single funding source will allow for cities, counties, and Continuums of Care greater flexibility to address the needs of their homeless population. OHS will be conducting a SOAR Training (SSI/SSDI Outreach, Access, and Recovery) on April 9 & 10. Contact OHS

<p><i>San Bernardino County Homelessness Action Plan: A Regional Strategy to be Completed by the County, Cities, and Continuum of Care</i></p>	<p>Don Smith</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The San Bernardino County Homelessness Action Plan (Action Plan) will be a multi-jurisdictional strategic plan that will be initiated and finalized by the County of San Bernardino, Cities, and the San Bernardino County Continuum of Care (CoC). The Action Plan will consist of various data driven steps that the County of San Bernardino, Cities, and the CoC will take in order to commit to, align, and implement core requirements and practices that have been nationally recognized as necessary actions to prevent and end homelessness. • Under the Governor's proposed 2019-2020 Budget: Jurisdictions that establish joint regional plans to address homelessness will be eligible for funding. Plans must include regional coordination between counties and cities and report all funds currently being used to provide housing and services to the homeless population in their regions (including but not limited to Mental Health Services Act funds, Realignment funds, and dedicated city and county funds). • In order to ensure a robust homeless assistance system capable of implementing an action plan to prevent and end homelessness for individuals and families who are homeless or at risk of becoming homeless there must be a system-wide commitment to core requirements and practices. We must make sure that all necessary public and private partners participate in the strategic alignment of resources behind core requirements and practices to ensure a robust homeless assistance system capable of implementing an action plan to prevent and end homelessness for individuals and families who are homeless or at risk of becoming homeless. • Joe Colletti, from the Institute for Urban Initiatives, will be leading several public planning workshops over the next couple of months to facilitate the development of the multi-jurisdictional strategic plan and will report back to the ICH. We are hoping to have the complete Homeless Action Plan by the June ICH meeting. • The first <i>San Bernardino County Homelessness Action Plan Multi-Jurisdictional Strategy Workshop</i>, will be held on March 19, 2019, from 9:00 a.m. – 12:00 p.m. at the San Bernardino County Health Services Auditorium – 850 E. Foothill Blvd., Rialto, CA 92376. All HPN member and other interested stakeholders are strongly encouraged to attend this and the subsequent other workshops in order to provide input into the development of the County's Multi-Jurisdictional Homelessness Action Plan. • The HPN West Valley Region will be focusing attention over the next year on working with the CoC, each city in the region and our regional service partners in a collaborative effort to foster more strategic alignment of resources and coordinated service delivery to help facilitate more efficient and effective housing solutions for all people experiencing or at-risk of homelessness in the region. • Meeting participants engaged in a brainstorming exercise on housing and homeless resources based in the West

		<p>Valley Region and beyond. The resource mapping exercise included identifying regionally based or accessible countywide programs providing shelter facilities, motel vouchers, transitional housing, eviction prevention, one-time rental assistance, rapid re-housing, permanent supportive housing, room and board and shared housing.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Attached to the minutes are the results from the brainstorming session. We will continue this exercise at our next meeting in May.
