HOME-ARP Overview

The \$5 million in HOME-ARP funding provides HOME grantees, in collaboration with other community stakeholders, a chance to make targeted, strategic investments in housing and other assistance for people experiencing homelessness and other vulnerable populations.



The City of San Bernardino's HOME ARP Allocation is \$5,000,000

Qualifying Population

Homeless Definition: An individual or family who lacks a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence.

- An individual or family who will imminently lose their primary nighttime residence and meet the criteria noted at 24 CFR 91.5.
- Unaccompanied youth under 25 years of age, or families with children and youth who would not otherwise qualify under the criteria above but meet the definition of homeless under other federal statutes as identified in 24 CFR 91.5.

Qualifying Population

At-Risk of Homelessness: An individual or family who:

Is extremely low-income
(under 30% AMI)

AND does not
have support
network to prevent
them from moving
into shelter

AND meets one of
the below
conditions

- Has moved because of economic reasons two or more times during the 60 days immediately preceding the application for homelessness prevention assistance;
- Is living in the home of another because of economic hardship;
- Has been notified in writing that their right to occupy their current housing or living situation will be terminated within 21 days after the date of application for assistance;
- Lives in a hotel or motel and the cost of the hotel or motel stay is not paid by charitable organizations or by federal, State, or local government programs for low-income individuals;
- Lives in a single-room occupancy or efficiency apartment unit in which there reside more than two persons or lives in a larger housing unit in which there reside more than 1.5 people per room, as defined by the U.S. Census Bureau;
- Is exiting a publicly funded institution or system of care (such as a health-care facility, a mental health facility, foster care, etc.)

Qualifying Population

Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, Sexual Violence, Stalking or Human Trafficking Definition is an individual or family who:

1. Is fleeing, or is attempting to flee domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, stalking, or other dangerous or life-threatening conditions that relate to violence against the individual or a family member.*

2. Has no other residence.

3. Lacks the resources or support network, e.g., family, friends, and faith-based or other social networks to obtain other permanent housing.

***Including a child, that has either taken place within the individual's or family's primary nighttime residence or has made the individual or family afraid to return to their primary nighttime residence.**

Qualifying Population

Other Populations: Requiring service or housing assistance to prevent homelessness:

Households (either individuals and families):

Who have previously been qualified as “homeless” as defined in 24 CFR 91.5.

Are currently housed due to temporary or emergency assistance.*

Who need additional housing assistance or supportive services to avoid a return to homelessness.

*** Including financial assistance, services, temporary rental assistance, or some other type of assistance to allow the household to be housed.**

Eligible Uses

Production or Preservation of Affordable Housing

Acquisition/ Development of Non-Congregate Shelter (NCS) or Rental Units

This activity includes the acquisition/development of a NCS or rental housing to support an eligible population.

Supportive Services

Services to assist eligible households transition to and maintain more appropriate housing. Examples include case management, mental health counseling or substance abuse counseling.

Tenant-Based Rental Assistance (TBRA) for income-eligible households

Eligible Uses

PRODUCTION / PRESERVATION OF AFFORDABLE HOUSING

Construction of new rental housing units;

Acquisition of existing housing units;

Re-investment/refinancing of existing affordable housing with the goal of serving lower incomes.

Non-Congregate Shelter (NCS): One or more buildings that provide private units or rooms for temporary shelter.

Eligible Activities: Acquisition of structures to be used as NCS (such as hotels)

Rehabilitation not required because structure is in standard condition

New Construction of structures to be used as NCS

Rehabilitation of existing structures (such as motels, nursing homes, or other facilities) to be used as NCS

Eligible Uses

Supportive Services in compliance with the following:

1. Qualifying individuals or families.
2. Separate activity or in combination with other HOME-ARP activities.
3. Not already receiving these service through another program.

There are 3 categories of eligible supportive services under HOME-ARP:

- McKinney-Vento (homeless/at-risk of homeless)
- Homelessness Prevention
- Housing Counseling


