

San Bernardino County has been a DMC county since March of 2018. Now own division. ASAM Criteria is like a textbook.	


What is ASAM-How is Placement Determined
American Society of Addiction Medicine (ASAM) Model
 Focuses on the whole patient, including all of their life areas, as well as all risks, needs, strengths and goals.
 No longer linear path of treatment
 The purpose of the level of care determination procedure is to assure that a client in need of substance use disorder services is placed in the least restrictive, but most clinically appropriate level of care available.
Withdrawal potential, health conditions, readiness to change, relapse potential, living and recovery environment, etc. all help determine placement in the system.





One out-of-county provider in LA county.
Helping a client – get them on the phone with SARC as quickly as possible. Case manager can be kept up to date. Patients can be transported to services – included in billable services.
Recovery residences / Transitional housing – available, based on their being actively engaged in treatment. Can be based on any treatment episode. Length of stay can be up to two years.
Referrals to residential come from the treatment programs.
