

Don began with an invitation to a more complete presentation on the subject happening Thursday, 8/18/2023. Info not included here due to timeliness expiring soon.

- Built for Zero is based on the premise that Homeless is SOLVABLE!
- 105 cities/counties participating across USA 14 have achieved NET ZERO (Bakersfield, CA among them)
- •147,000 homeless housed by those communities since 2015.
- Built for Zero is a movement, a methodology. It is NOT a homeless agency itself.
- Ending homelessness begins by knowing each person experiencing homelessness by name, in real-time, and designing racially equitable systems that account for every single person.
- recommended process is to select one subpopulation among the homeless population to focus upon such as veterans or the chronically, homeless and work hard to achieve net zero with just that sub population. Bakersfield has achieved net zero in about one year with the chronically homeless some population there. Examples of other subpopulations are families, youth, singles, etc.
- BfZ has developed systems to share with communities (cities/counties) rather than individual agencies to work to overcome barriers of inter-communication between agencies. Willingness for agencies to track data and share data so that information regarding individuals helped by different organizations is coordinated, a key to the success of BfZ.
- the goal is that fewer people are experiencing homelessness than can routinely exit homelessness in a month.
- Built for Zero is a national initiative that helps communities develop data-driven systems that are designed to reduce homelessness toward a state where homelessness is rare and brief for a population, known as functional zero. Making homelessness rare and brief takes more than a single intervention or sector it takes the full force of a community-wide system designed to solve the problem. The goal is shifting a community's homeless services from being designed to respond to the problem, to being designed to measurably end it.
- The first step to solving homelessness is having a shared definition of what we are trying to achieve.
- Functional zero does not mean nobody is experiencing homelessness, or that no one will experience homelessness. It does mean that a community has driven that number down toward zero and is keeping it below the community's capacity to ensure positive exits from homelessness.
- Functional zero for all populations: A community has ended homelessness for all populations when:
 - 1. Rare. The number of people experiencing homelessness across all populations must consistently remain below a level, known as their functional zero threshold.
 - 2. Brief. When homelessness does occur, it must be an experience that quickly passes. Communities at functional zero ensure that the average length of time from identification to move-in is 45 days or less.
 - 3. Nonrecurring. Homelessness should be resolved, for good. No more than 5% of exits should result in a return to homelessness within two years of the system's service or support.
 - 4. Equitable. Communities must close racial and ethnic disproportionality in housing placements, return to homelessness, and the average length of time from identification to housing.
- One of the key challenges to ending homelessness is the distributed and fragmented system of homelessness response. In any community, dozens or even hundreds of organizations may serve people experiencing homelessness, each defining

		success by their own program measures. Communities in Built for Zero begin by breaking down these siloes to establish a unified team that creates shared accountability for driving homelessness toward zero. • By maintaining a by-name list, communities have current and detailed information on every unhoused person in a population. With this detailed information, they are able to better match housing solutions with the needs of the individuals. • The support that BfZ provides to communities is designed to help establish strong and resilient systems and accelerate progress toward ending homelessness. Member Roundtable Public Comment	Wendell	 Quinton (being called away) handed this segment over to Wendell Wilson who invited sharing Paul Fournier: Lutheran Social Services (whose charter focuses on single men with housing issues) is expanding from 70 to 140 beds for intermediate supportive housing and is celebrating that expansion in October and would welcome participation. Wendell Wilson: SBCo has sponsored a series of meetings in the Mountain Region for open forums on the Short term rental situation. Perhaps looking to limit the STR's in favor of openings for more long-term rentals to ease the housing shortage. Only in the fact-finding stage now. Paul: It appears that the surge in STR's has cooled and Long-term rentals are increasing already.
