Looking back 2023 & Looking forward 2024	Wendell Wilson	#1: Personal history/experience with Homelessness For 10 years in Tacoma, chair of homeless agency called Network dealing with transitional housing. In those days, if you were homeless in Washington, DPS took your children away. Our agency with others took sued the state and after 10 years won on behalf of homeless families, awarding @\$35 million for homeless services. We used some to purchase 2 Four-plexes for homeless. At the time HUD was into Transitional Housing so facilitated our project. One observation: other states are not as complicated and bureaucratic as Calif. Homeless services. Just a bit of history of homeless services from my experience. #2. How many homeless we have	

Last year, acc. to Joe Coletti and the PITC count, 181,000 homeless in California—sheltered and unsheltered. And in SB Co., 4,200 – a majority unsheltered. In LA Co. 52,000! Important that HHAP allots funds according to the PITC count. We have just under 2% of SB Co. or about 70 people. Additionally, from Big Bear schools report, we have and additional 200 sheltered (McKinney-Vento families) but not literally homeless who are couch-surfing with friends/family.

#3. Information from Carrie Harmon & Marcus Dillard offices

Comment on how the Mountains differ from the rest of the state, LA being the extreme example. In spite of much effort in LA, the count has gone up as much as 25%. Currently, Mayor Bass has committed the city to renting hotels and have put thousands into those lodgings. But not a lot of permanent housing. One very significant and sad development: Skid Row Housing which housed many people through purchase of older and even run-down bldgs., has run into significant management problems as well as aging, run-down facilities with vacancies/red-tagged units by city, etc., adding to more people in the encampments and on the streets. Different from the mountains where we do have a few encampments in the forests, etc., but nothing as obvious to the public as LA.

#4. PowerPoint (Becky Beavers) to show 2023 Report for MHC

55% increase over 2022 in calls to our HelpLine so people are beginning to realize we are here. We have clearly reduced the total number of homeless in these mountains. Able to do this with only three full-time employees = Operations Director Becky Beavers and two Navigators/Case-Workers: Susan Buckley (Rim Area) and Tyne Henry (BigBear). No Office to maintain. Navigators' cars are our "office." Funding from Government DOWN 21% with small increase in individual/local business funding. Major setback was the Tulip Lane cabins purchase falling through due to a technicality in our grant proposal for \$1-million+ while the \$30-million and \$40-million grants in the state were approved. Our Georgia Street Cabins are still running well with one wrinkle of a costly tenant removal. We house people at 30% of income so for some that means only \$300 - \$400 a month rent. We are Master-Leasing the same Tulip Lane Cabins that we could not purchase, so we are housing folks at the same 30% of income but for temporary housing only as folks try to work out a housing situation. Last year more people housed in hotels b/c we don't have any shelters here in the mountains.

Rental Housing – we helped 60 people/30 households maintain their rental housing through utility and monthly rent assistance/eviction prevention. A 300% increase over 2022. (\$1,100 average cost.)

Permanent Housing is our main goal and we permanently housed 89 folks/50 households. – (One household per week an \$1500 average cost.) Among these folks housed are some that have been homeless for up to five years!

We hope to add the modular homes that we have purchased and are waiting for us to move up from down the hill with ADA handicapped amenities. The City of Big Bear Lake is still holding up the permit process, but we hope soon to bring them up. Other general help has been given – gasoline/food/moving assistance, incl. U-Haul rentals/furniture/school supplies & snacks/tents & sleeping bags provided/warm clothing & blankets/bus tokens for down-the-hill trips for doctors, etc.

#5. 2024 Grants via the County for Homeless services: All in the FIRST QUARTER coming up --

Emergency Solutions Grant – several \$\$Million, of which in the past we received \$250K. Provides money for the street outreach for shelter in motels and for rapid rehousing/eviction prevention.

Home/ARP Grant (ARP = American Rescue Plan) – aimed at new housing/supportive housing/affordable housing. Perhaps helping us reapply for funding for the six units up in Big Bear (Tulip Lane). Carrie Harmon referred to a go-to source for info.: Homeless RFP List Service (RFP – Request For Proposal).

Training/Technical Advice – opportunities in the First Quarter 2024 from the County (esp. re: HHAP funding). ---That's all in the First Quarter.

DISCUSSION ITEMS		The state's deficit is in the -\$60Billion neighborhood so we realize that our funding will be less available so we are looking for alternatives – grant writing and individual contributions. #6. How the Economy Affects Homelessness E.g., 1. the auto industry fall-back in the Detroit area 30 years ago still impacting homeless around the country. 2. COVID's affect in Calif. – Government in Calif. set up funding at \$500million to assist with Motel vouchers for a month or so. But sadly, did not help the Permanent Housing situation since there weren't enough case-workers to help the people lodged in motels to work out a permanent solution to their homelessness and folks ended up back on the streets. Shortly thereafter, they came out with Project HomeKey to provide flexible funding for project purchases and for monthly maintenance of properties operated by non-profits for 2 years. This has helped us to become self-sustaining with our Georgia Street Cabins project. We don't have data about how much the money has changed the scene on Permanent Housing, how many who were housed have been able to remain housed.
